Preserve Your IRSSA Abuse Claims Before They Are Lost

About IAP and ADR Records

The IAP is the Independent Assessment Process for compensation claims of abuse at residential schools. The ADR was the earlier Alternative Dispute Resolution process.

These records include your name and all of the information you provided for your IAP or ADR claim, everything you said at your hearing, what the adjudicator said about you in their decision, and the compensation you received.

If you made an IAP or ADR claim for compensation for residential school abuse, the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement says that you can request a copy for yourself and save your IAP or ADR records for history, public education, and research.

You have four options for your IAP or ADR records.

- 1. Do nothing and your records will remain confidential until they are destroyed on September 19, 2027.
- 2. Get a copy for yourself to keep or share with others by submitting the Request Form (See reverse side).
- 3. Preserve them for history, public education and research at the NCTR by submitting this Consent Form (See reverse side).
- 4. Get a copy for yourself and preserve them for history, public education and research at the NCTR by submitting both the Request and Consent forms.
- 5. The choice is yours and yours alone and your IAP or ADR records are confidential.

You have until September 19, 2027 to decide.
